CODE OF CONDUCT

The Russian school "Luchik" Milton Keynes and Bedford consists of children, staff, parents and the Committee members, who work together to fulfil the aims of the school.

We recognise that it is everyone's responsibility to promote positive behaviour and enhance self-esteem in our pupils by encouraging good conduct and creating an environment in which learning can flourish.

The responsibility of staff

- To respect each individual child
- To offer children a balanced curriculum and to ensure that the work offered is related to each child's level of learning and potential.
- To ensure that lessons are interesting and stimulating
- To ensure that the classrooms and the school as a whole are attractive and safe places in which to work
- To ensure that parents are informed about and involved in the child's educational progress through the school
- To provide appropriate homework on a regular basis

The responsibility of the parents

- To support the school

-Any concerns about the school should be shared privately with the school coordinator and/or staff. Criticism in front of children will serve to undermine their confidence and positive attitude towards school and learning

- To explain to children that school is a place for learning
- To explain to children that they must respect all children, staff and parents in our community

-Anti-social behaviour of any kind will not be tolerated

- To ensure that the child attends school and is punctual

-Parents need to recognise that time spent away, unnecessarily, can hinder the learning process

- To ensure that the child is fit for school

- For example: by making sure that the child has had enough sleep and does not come to school tired and irritable; by making sure that the child does not watch disturbing television programmes or videos

- To encourage the completion of homework and provide help and support when needed.

The responsibility of pupils

- To be polite, kind and considerate to everyone in our community and learn to listen to people's point of view
- To work hard and do their best and do nothing to prevent others from working
- To accept responsibility for their actions and to accept reprimands gracefully
- To keep the school clean and tidy
- To move carefully and sensibly round the school
- To take responsibility for completing homework and return it on time

Rewards

- Praise encouragement will be given freely and often
- Stickers will be given for good work and homework
- Special stickers will be given for exceptional work
- Certificates are awarded for exceptional work and for wide range of good behaviour and manners and attendance
- Class points will be given for good group work and special time will be awarded for a class which collected ten points

Sanctions

We have a positive approach to good behaviour, given praise to those children who are well behaved, polite and hard working. However, some pupils do not always behave in acceptable way. These are the strategies we use to promote positive behaviour:

1. A child may be required to work alone at a table in a classroom
2. A child may be required to work with another teacher
3. A child may be required to 'make up time' during a play time
4. Parents are asked to have a meeting with class teacher, coordinator, or committee member
5. Behaviour chats will be put into place
6. Child may be denied opportunity of going on and outings with school activity
7. Teachers will keep a record of any persistent difficulties that a child may be having in consultation with school coordinator
8. If unacceptable behaviour continues, the coordinator will invite the parents into school to discuss the problem further regular meetings may well need to be instituted to monitor the situation
9. If persistent misbehaviour continues, the coordinator may ask parents for the agreement in approaching relevant support service
10. The management committee will be informed at this stage and they might decide to exclude a child for fixed time or permanently
11. This extreme step will be taken when
 - a very serious incident occurs which causes a child or adult to be hurt
 - a child has become uncontrollable, hits or swears at any member of staff

- it has been proved that child has stolen or damaged someone else's property
- over period of days a child's behaviour has been such that they're interfering seriously with other children's learning or they have to be removed repeatedly from the classroom and supervised by another member of the staff
